

HARVESTING DREAMS: CARLOS ALBERTO ORDÓÑEZ

**STORY** 









During the dry season, they struggle through the hardships of drought and food scarcity. For several years, they lived in a small home made of solidified mud and a thatched roof along a river bed. During the rainy season, flash floods often caused the river to overflow, sometimes ruining their crops, drowning their livestock, and flooding their home. The family was constantly forced to leave their home and seek shelter from neighbors facing similar living conditions.

Like many families in Aquas Calientes, Carlos relied on unproductive farming practices passed on from generations before him. As a result, yield was minimal and his family suffered extended periods of food shortage.

After attending ANF's training workshops, Carlos learned that by making small changes he could not only increase the quantity but also the quality of his crop production.

In less than a year, he managed to increase his income in two ways: multiply the amount of production (by a factor of four) and raise the selling price due to the increase in quality.

Witnessing his potential, ANF included Carlos in an innovative enterprise to raise pigs and convert animal waste into renewable energy and organic fertilizer, through the use of biodigesters. This technology allows Carlos and fertilizer and cooking fuel.

"Now," Corina says, "we don't have to cut trees for firewood, nor does our house get filled with smoke when we cook." This project considerably lowers the risks associated with indoor air pollution, the so-called killer in the kitchen, one of Nicaragua's leading health threats.

The pigs, pigpen, and training involved in the biodigester project provide Carlos and his family with an additional source of income. The unique breed of pigs Carlos received from ANF is superior to the pigs he previously raised, which bred 6 piglets at a time. Currently, he is breeding 14 piglets at a time and since they weigh twice as much, Carlos's piglets are worth much more.

With the support of ANF and its partners, and the persevearance of the Ordónez family, Carlos has fulfilled his dream of building a dignified and safe home for his wife and kids.







# **ENABLING DIGNIFIED LIVING CONDITIONS**

Since 1998, ANF has been working with Food for the Poor and the Government of Nicaragua to improve the living conditions of impoverished families through the construction of dignified, two-bedroom houses. In many rural communities where ANF builds homes, we often build medical centers, community centers, and schools. Moreover, ANF provides families with tools and training to improve their livelihoods.

# FOSTERING GOOD HEALTH AND WELLBEING

ANF is committed to improving the access to and quality of medical attention provided to people living in poverty across Nicaragua. ANF distributes food, medicine, medical supplies, and equipment to a network of more than 130 health centers throughout the country. Additionally, ANF supports feeding and nutritional recovery programs and carries out health education campaigns for low-income students and their families.

# REMOVING THE BARRIERS TO EDUCATION

ANF focuses its educational programs on reducing the indirect costs of education, thereby creating incentives for parents to send their children to school. This is accomplished through the distribution of in-kind donations (school supplies, books, classroom furniture) and the implementation of school feeding programs. Additionally, ANF supports the construction of classrooms, computer labs, and water and sanitation stations.

ANF aims to promote sustainable agricultural practices in an effort to help rural families in Nicaragua achieve food security and sustained economic growth, while contributing to the maintenance of ecosystems and strengthening capacities to adapt to local climate change. Through its Center for Agricultural Training, ANF also promotes agricultural research and new, low-cost technologies to improve small-scale farmer's agricultural knowledge and practices.
